A Tribute to Raymond "Keola" Camacho & David Tilford

They both were skilled archers, board members over the years at Sylvan Archers, and my hunting partners. My heart is broken and it is extremely difficult for me to even talk about this, but I have been asked to write a tribute about their lives and they deserve it. Honestly, I break down when I think about it and my emotions overtake me. That's why it is tough for me.

How do you even begin a tribute to someone's life? I am not a professional writer, nor do I pretend to be one, but I looked up "tribute" and Webster's definition is:

Tribute: an act, statement, or gift that is intended to show gratitude, respect, or admiration.

WOW! I will attempt this tribute because my heart again tells me that they deserve this as my gift for their impact on my life.

My Tribute to Raymond "Keola" Camacho

Keola passed away doing what he loved to do, snorkel spear fishing in the Pacific Ocean in Kailu Kona, Hawaii.

He was 47 years old. Apparently he blacked out during one of his dives and friends and first responders couldn't revive him. He was back at his roots as he was a chiseled Hawaiian with tons of tattoos and tough as nails. I used to tease him that he looked like a hardened criminal, but he had a heart of gold. Keola was a very giving person. He was always on the move, doing or building something, and it was always related to hunting. If any of you knew Keola, he literally loved hunting. He would have done it 24/7, if possible. Keola was employed at Archer's Afield Tigard as one of their lead sales people and bow technicians for years. He probably sold you one of their traditional or compound bows and outfitted it with the proper accessories. Additionally, if he liked you, he would guide you and show you excellent hunting areas, mostly on the properties I had gotten permission for us to hunt on.

Being a professional bow shop, Archers Afield referred a lot of people to Sylvan Archery Club. Naturally,

Keola spent a huge amount of time at Sylvan Archers. In fact, many people thought he had a permanent residency onsite. As a board member, Keola helped setup all the Broadhead League Shoots and 3-D Shoots over a period of 8-10 years. Additionally, he was solely responsible for the Hawaiian pig feed. The contributions of time and energy that Keola gave to Sylvan Archery Club were instrumental to help increase membership immensely. We all owe Keola a lot of gratitude for making Sylvan Archery Club what it is today. What a legacy he left.

Memorial Service was held on Saturday, November 18th at the Riverside Baptist Church in Weiser, Idaho.

Burial was at the Hillcrest Cemetery in Weiser, Idaho. David was buried next to his baby sister, Gwendolyn. Susan Buffington (David's Sister) said that she "wrapped his urn in one of his hunting shirts and had it buried with his favorite elk tooth necklace and a picture of him and Sara, his dog, sitting on top of it."

The Blessing that was read at the committal service at the cemetery was:

At the rising of the sun and its going down, We remember him. At the blowing of the wind and in the chill of the winter, We remember him. At the opening of the buds and in the rebirth of spring, We remember him. At the rustling of the leaves and in the beauty of autumn, We remember him. At the beginning of the year and when it ends, We remember him. As long we live, he too will live. He is part of us. We remember him.

My Tribute to David Tilford

Similar to Keola, David passed away doing what he loved, hunting in central Oregon during archery bow season. He died at the age of 65. Apparently he died of a heart attack as other hunters in the general area discovered him. David was also a board member of Sylvan Archery Club and served during the same period as Keola. A lot of people thought David and Keola were joined at the hip and they both were bow hunting crazed. David's passion and love for the outdoors couldn't be denied. He had a love of God, family and country. In addition to archery, David was a very skilled fly fisherman. David, like Keola, helped setup the Broadhead League and the 3-D Shoots. Keola and David worked hand in hand with one another as a team. David's contribution of his time and energy to Sylvan Archery Club was huge and his legacy should not be forgotten.

In Memory...

I tragically lost two of my closest friends and hunting partners literally within a week of each other. I have had a hard time accepting that they are gone and at times find myself picking up the phone to talk to them and realizing that they are gone. However, their legacy is not gone. As one can clearly see, David's and Keola's finger prints are all over our club. Their contributions were huge and helped build and form Sylvan Archers to the outstanding status it enjoys today. Hopefully, I have given you an insight to each one of them and how their lives should never be forgotten.
